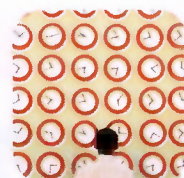

The Laff Box is a machine that produces the sound of laughter. It <sup>1</sup>\_\_\_\_\_ (invent) in 1953 by a sound engineer called Charlie Douglass.
